


**Highlights**

- Mid-Atlantic ultra-low sulfur (ULS) distillate inventories increased 0.6 million barrels (2.0%) since last week to 35.7 million barrels. Inventories are 62.6% above the year-ago level and 55.2% above the 5-year average.
- The weekly average U.S. WTI crude oil spot price increased \$0.87 per barrel (2.3%) since last week to \$39.22 per barrel. Current prices are \$19.16 per barrel (32.8%) below the year-ago weekly average of \$58.38 per barrel.
- New York Statewide average retail prices of ultra-low sulfur (ULS) heating oil and kerosene increased while the average retail price of propane decreased since the last survey.

**Retail Petroleum Prices**—On a statewide basis since the last survey on June 15<sup>th</sup>, prices increased \$0.031/gallon (1.3%) to \$2.341/gallon for ULS heating oil, \$0.046/gallon (1.6%) to \$2.920/gallon for kerosene, and the price decreased \$0.011/gallon (0.4%) to \$2.464/gallon for propane. Compared to a year earlier, prices decreased \$0.815/gallon (25.8%) for heating oil, \$0.655/gallon (18.3%) for kerosene, and \$0.365/gallon (12.9%) for propane.

**Crude Oil Prices**—For the week ending 6/26/2020, WTI crude oil spot prices averaged \$39.22/bbl, an increase of \$0.87/bbl (2.3%) from the week-ago average of \$38.35/bbl. WTI prices are now \$19.16/bbl (32.8%) below the year-ago weekly average of \$58.38/bbl. The all-time weekly average high of \$142.52/bbl occurred on 7/04/08.

**Spot Natural Gas Prices**—For the week ending 6/26/2020, Henry Hub natural gas spot prices averaged \$1.528 per million Btu (mmBtu), an increase of \$0.082/mmBtu (5.7%) from the prior week level of \$1.446/mmBtu. Prices are currently \$0.774/mmBtu (33.6%) below the year-earlier weekly average of \$2.302/mmBtu.



**Residential Natural Gas Prices**—The NYS average price in April 2020 was \$1.174/therm, an increase of \$0.013/therm (1.1%) from the March 2020 price of \$1.161/therm, and was the same price as the year earlier average of \$1.174/therm.

**Historic Retail Prices**—Statewide average high and low prices since Sept. 1997 for heating oil & propane & Sept. 2000 for kerosene.


- Heating oil—highest price \$4.778/gallon on 7/14/08, lowest price \$0.876/gallon on 9/08/98.
- Propane—highest price \$3.811/gallon on 2/17/14, lowest price \$1.072/gallon on 9/20/99.
- Kerosene—highest price \$5.068/gallon on 7/14/08, lowest price \$1.309/gallon on 9/09/02.




**Heating Degree Days**—Until the start of the next heating season in October, the heating degree-day information below reflects weekly information through April 25, 2020. Cumulative statewide heating degree-days from October 1<sup>st</sup> through April 25<sup>th</sup> end the current season at 5,368, which is behind the year-ago level (5,728) by 6.3% and behind the normal trend (5,737) by 6.4%.






**Propane Stocks**—Current and historic heating fuel inventory data is presented in the graphs below.




**Retail Btu Price Equivalents**—The New York State heating fuel prices Btu graph equates the retail price for New York State wide average residential ultra-low sulfur heating oil, kerosene, propane, and natural gas on a dollar per million Btu (MMBtu) basis.



Note: Natural gas prices are from the U.S. EIA and provided on a monthly basis and delayed by 3 months. The monthly average price of natural gas is higher during the summer months due to low delivery volumes and fixed delivery charges and does not necessarily indicate a higher underlying supply price. Higher average natural gas prices in the summer months are not indicative of higher future prices during the winter months.

**Spot Btu Price Equivalents**—The Btu spot market graph equates the spot market price, in table below, for NY Harbor ultra-low sulfur diesel fuel and 0.3% sulfur high pour #6 residual fuel, Mont Belvieu propane, and the New York City gate natural gas price on a dollar per million Btu (MMBtu) basis.






