Session 1: Updates on Policy and Programs Targeted at Energy Affordability and Improving Access to Clean Energy Solutions

Through Governor Andrew M. Cuomo's Reforming the Energy Vision (REV) strategy, New York State has undertaken significant steps to improve energy affordability and access to clean energy options for low- to moderate-income New Yorkers. Proceedings addressing energy affordability (14-M-0565), retail access (12-M-0476), and the value of Distributed Energy Resources (DER) (15-E-0751) will provide low-income customers and communities with greater opportunities to reduce energy burdens and access clean energy options. Through the Clean Energy Fund (CEF), NYSERDA is making significant investments to increase access to clean energy solutions for low- to moderate-income customers by addressing the barriers that often prevent them from benefiting from energy efficiency and renewable energy. In addition, NYS Homes and Community Renewal (HCR) has increased the building performance of affordable new construction projects through initiatives such as the development of higher energy efficiency standards for projects that qualify for the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC), implementing Green Building Criteria, and the development of an integrated physical needs assessment. This session will provide attendees with an update on REV and the CEF, as well as an overview of key strategies and initiatives specific to low- to moderate-income New Yorkers.
