In response to RESRFP23 Section 4.3.8 Community Engagement, Canisteo Wind Energy LLC (CWE) is providing the enclosed Public Involvement Program (PIP) Plan that was prepared, submitted, and approved under Article 10 and was published to the DMM in March 2017. The outreach described in the attached PIP was carried out in full, as the Appendix D Meeting Logs indicate. In addition to the PIP Plan, CWE has prepared the following responses to supplement the submission requirements for Community Engagement:

- 2) Detail outreach strategies and activities the Proposer has implemented to date and will use to engage stakeholders and interested parties, including affected agencies, and to encourage public involvement throughout the pre -award, development, construction, and operation phases (consistent with the Project Milestone Schedule), including methods of communication and specific channels the Proposer intends to use to disseminate Bid Facility information.

Refer to the updated Appendix D – PIP Tracking Report (Attachment 2 herein) which provides a chronological record of meetings to date. During the development of the project, we have held 8 landowner dinners, 3 public hearings, attended 394 town meetings, and attended 11 local public events over 8 years in the project area notifying stakeholders of public events and project information. Our local agent continues to attend every town board meeting in the project area every month, to continue to keep local stakeholders informed of project progress, and we have maintained a public office in the Village of Canisteo since 2018 to provide information to the public. The office remains open and staffed and continues to get regular foot traffic.

- 3) Applicability of the Climate Act goals regarding benefits to Disadvantaged Communities (DACs) that would be realized with the development and construction of the Bid Facility.

CWE is a component of the Clean Path NY (CPNY) Tier 4 resource portfolio. Clean Path NY is establishing a \$270 million dollar Community Investment Fund (Fund) targeting DACs as detailed below. All of CPNY’s generation projects and its transmission component each contribute financially to participate in supporting the Fund. Although

CPNY is still in the process of launching the Fund, a dedicated team from CPNY is tasked with administering this initiative until it begins formal operations under the direction of an Executive Director and Board of Directors. In Attachment G of this document, CWE's proportional allocation of financial contribution to the Fund is specified. The dollar amount shown in Attachment G is based on the Project's pro rata share of the total capital cost of the CPNY portfolio.

The Clean Path NY Community Investment Fund seeks to support initiatives around four key areas, with a focus on targeting investments in DACs:

- Enabling a just transition to the new clean energy economy through workforce development, apprenticeship, and local hiring programs;
- Education programs at all levels focused on climate justice, energy literacy, and STEM;
- Expanding access to health care in DACs in recognition that these frontline communities have, for too long, borne a disproportionate burden of the fossil fuel economy; and
- Environmental stewardship and conservation, which is intended to support various local initiatives sought by communities across the State. These may include land conservation, habitat restoration, park rehabilitation or expansion, and in more urban communities, a focus on beneficial electrification of affordable housing, which carries with it co-benefits of further air quality enhancement, economic development opportunities, and job creation.
- In alignment with CPNY's PSA NYSERDA will participate in developing the governance and structure of the Fund to ensure its alignment with the State's intended goals.

Although there are no Disadvantaged Communities areas identified within the Project area, the PILOT agreement and IDA fee has been identified to benefit Disadvantaged Communities as these payments will benefit the entire county, which includes Disadvantaged Communities areas elsewhere in the county. Additionally, since adding renewables to the grid lowers the overall price of power, this Project along with others will help reduce electric bills for all residents, including the lowest-income residents.

- 4) Planned frequency of public events and the anticipated duration, in years, of the public engagement events of community outreach, and strategies to ensure that public engagement events are widely attended by a representative cross section of host community residents.

Public events and community outreach events are detailed in Appendix D, PIP Tracking Report.

- 5) Details of the direct benefits to the community the Proposer will advance, which may include a local ownership stake in the facility, reduced energy bills for those with homes or businesses in the Bid Facility's vicinity, and/or other direct benefits.

With the award of a contract under RESRFP-23, CWE would provide \$252,000 annually in energy bill credits to local homes and businesses in the host towns.

- 6) Details on past/planned engagement regarding payments in lieu of taxes (PILOT) agreements or host community agreements (HCAs).

HCAs have been executed in all six host towns, as well as a PILOT in Steuben County.

- 7) Describe local interests and concerns, including identifying plans to thoughtfully build support for and respectfully responding to any opposition to the Bid Facility.

Wind projects have proven to be great partners to communities throughout Steuben County and CWE has benefitted from this as we have seen little opposition to the project over the years. Without continued support from the community, this Project would not have sustained the longevity that enables it to bid into RESRFP-23 today. At this stage of development, all concerns that could be addressed by design changes have been accommodated.

- 8) Identify strategies the Proposer will use to mitigate concerns raised by the public regarding the Bid Facility. This may include visibility and watershed impact mitigation efforts, accommodations to co-locate agricultural activities, or other issues of importance to the host communities.

Through more than two decades of energy development throughout the United States, Invenergy attributes its success in construction of projects by maintaining an active presence in the community, building relationships locally, and working diligently to defend the project against misinformation, legal challenges, and continuing to advance the economic benefit packages the project will offer the host communities. CWE is already in possession of Article 10 and Article VII Certificates required to construct the Project and has been conducting a rigorous community outreach effort since its inception. Additionally, as part of the Article 10 and Article VII compliance filings, CWE will submit public notification requirements concerning construction schedule and a complaint management plan, as well as share the received complaints with the host community town boards. Furthermore, CWE had prepared and will manage a traffic control plan coordination with local highway supers including outreach to Amish elders, as well as noise compliance testing post-commercial operation date, shadow flicker modeling and mitigation and construction restoration requirements.

- 9) 9) Method for soliciting feedback and input from the public and affected agencies and the process for sharing feedback and responses publicly.

Refer to Section 5, beginning on Page 10 of the attached PIP. Additionally, CWE has prepared complaint management procedures as a requirement of the Article VII and Article 10 Certificate conditions which allows the public to submit complaints and concerns regarding the Project to the Project team, which will also be shared with the host community town boards.

Please note that the attached PIP Plan is being submitted except for original Appendices B-D to comply with RESRFP23 pagination requirements. Attachment A has been reformatted, and the PIP Log has been condensed.

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## **1 Introduction**

Canisteo Wind Energy LLC (CWE) plans to submit an Application to construct a major electric generating facility under Article 10 of the Public Service Law (PSL). Pursuant to the rules of the New York State Board on Electric Generation Siting and the Environment (Siting Board), applicants proposing to submit an Application to construct a major electric generating facility under Article 10 must submit a Public Involvement Program plan (PIP). The PIP must be submitted to the Department of Public Service (DPS) for review at least 150 days prior to filing a Preliminary Scoping Statement (PSS). This document is the PIP plan for the Canisteo Wind Energy Center (the Project), a wind energy facility described in Section 2.

As required by 16 NYCRR § 1000.4, this PIP describes the steps CWE plans to take to inform, engage, and solicit input from the local community, general public, and other stakeholders.

## **2 Applicant and Project Description**

### **2.1 Company Profile**

Canisteo Wind Energy LLC is an affiliate of Invenergy Wind North America LLC (Invenergy). Invenergy is a utility-scale power producer developing renewable energy projects in the New York State energy market. Invenergy-owned energy projects operate under the supervision and regulatory authority of the New York State Public Service Commission (PSC) and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). Invenergy and CWE management offices are located in Chicago, Illinois.

Invenergy has developed over 60 wind farms in the United States, Canada, and Europe including the following three New York wind farms:

- High Sheldon Wind Farm, 75 turbines located in the Town of Sheldon, Wyoming County, NY.
- Orangeville Wind Farm, 58 turbines located in the Town of Orangeville, Wyoming County, NY.
- Marsh Hill Wind Farm, 10 turbines located in the Town of Jasper, Steuben County, NY.

Invenergy provides wholesale electricity to the public using clean, renewable sources such as wind. This furthers the federal government's policy as articulated in 42 U.S.C. 9201 to "hasten the widespread utilization of [wind energy] systems," as well as the State of New York's renewable energy policy, which requires 30% of the State's energy to come from renewable sources such as wind by the year 2015.

CWE intends to construct, own, operate, and maintain all components of the Project, except for the interconnection switchyard which will be constructed by CWE, and then transferred to New York State Electric and Gas (NYSEG), who will own, operate, and maintain the switchyard.

### **2.2 Project Summary**

CWE is planning the Project to have a maximum generating capability of 290.7 megawatts (MW) from an estimated 90 wind turbines located on land leased from owners of private property located in the Towns of Cameron, Canisteo, Greenwood, Jasper, Troupsburg, and West Union in Steuben County, New York (Figure 1). The Project Area includes the Marsh Hill Wind Farm mentioned above. There will be no

electrical or permitting connection between the two projects. Currently there is no on-site O&M crew serving Marsh Hill; the turbines are maintained by staff based at the Invenergy's O&M Facility in Sheldon, NY. Once CWE should become operational, it would develop an on-site O&M staff for both CWE and Marsh Hill turbines.

Project facilities will include commercial-scale wind turbines, access roads, buried and overhead electric collection lines, a Project substation, meteorological towers, an operation and maintenance (O&M) building, and electrical interconnection facilities. CWE anticipates the interconnection facilities will include an overhead 115-kV interconnection line approximately 10 miles long from a Project substation in the Project Area to NYSEG's Bennett substation on State Rt. 36 in the Town of Hornellsville.

This transmission line would be subject to Public Service Law Article VII, rather than the Article 10 process. CWE plans to submit its Article VII and Article 10 applications concurrently and as part of its PIP outreach activities CWE will describe the transmission line and the wind energy facility.

### 2.3 Energy Generation

CWE expects the Project will operate at an annual net capacity factor (NCF) of 32%. This means the Project, if built at the maximum expected generating capacity of 290.7 MW, would generate approximately 814,000 megawatt hours (MWh) of energy per year. This will be enough electricity to meet the average annual consumption of 75,000 or 113,000 households, based on average annual household electric consumption of 10.8 MWh for the U.S. and 7.2 MWh for New York State, respectively (EIA, 2014).

### 2.4 Economic Benefits

The Project would have positive socioeconomic impacts of permanent O&M jobs, temporary construction employment, lease payments to landowners, and a new source of revenue for schools, fire departments, county government, and town governments. National Renewable Energy Laboratory's (NREL) Jobs and Economic Development Impact (JEDI) model estimates Project construction will create approximately 140 jobs with a payroll of \$12 million. To operate and maintain the Project, CWE estimates it will hire approximately ten full time employees to be located at the site. The construction jobs would last approximately one year, and the operations and maintenance jobs would last for the life of the Project.

The Project plans to enter into a PILOT agreement with the County Industrial Development Agency and it will be subject to special district taxes. Specific estimates of amounts the Project might pay to different jurisdictions will depend on the Project layout and structure of the agreements. Based on similar arrangements at other wind projects in New York, CWE estimates a 290 MW project will generate approximately \$2,500,000 per year in taxes and tax-related payments to the county, towns, school districts, and fire departments that serve the parcels where CWE installs Project facilities.

### 2.5 Project Area and Study Area

Figure 1 shows the regional Project location, preliminary Project Area and preliminary Study Area for the Project. For purposes of this document, CWE is defining these areas as follows:

- Project Area is comprised of all tax parcels on which Project facilities are expected to be located, plus areas bounded by those tax parcels. As shown in Figure 1, the Project Area is oblong, running from southwest to northeast, and includes approximately 35,000+ acres of land.
- Study Area is all areas of New York and Pennsylvania within 5 miles of the boundaries of the Project Area.

The Project Area and Study Area are based on preliminary estimates of where facilities could be located.

### **3 Public Involvement Program Plan Overview**

#### **3.1 PIP Goals**

CWE developed this PIP to ensure comments of individuals and groups with a potential interest in the Project are objectively considered in the Project design and review. Specific PIP goals are to:

- Identify groups and individuals with a potential interest in the Project, i.e., “stakeholders;”
- Ensure stakeholders are aware of the Project;
- Ensure stakeholders can relatively conveniently access information on the Project and the Article 10 review process;
- Engage stakeholders to understand their interests related to the Project, so that CWE can work with them to address their concerns and take them into account as the project moves forward
- Gather specific information from stakeholders that can be used to design objective and useful studies to be defined in the Preliminary Scoping Statement and included in a complete application for the Project.

#### **3.2 PIP Schedule**

CWE began conducting PIP activities during the pre-application phase in April 2016, and it will continue until the Project begins commercial operation. Specific PIP activities and their schedules are discussed in Section 5.

#### **3.3 Stakeholder Involvement**

##### **Stakeholder Notifications**

CWE will notify stakeholders of the important Project milestones listed below. Stakeholder notifications will be by US Mail, except as discussed below for area residents and except for stakeholders that express a preference for email notification.

- Open Houses
- Preliminary Scoping Statement (PSS) Submittal

- Application Submittal
- Public Hearing
- Siting Board Decision
- Commencement of Construction
- Commercial Operations Date

#### Collection of Stakeholder Input

For stakeholder groups in sections 4.1-4.12 below, CWE will reach out to the point of contact to introduce the Project and offer to meet with the stakeholder group or point of contact. At stakeholder meetings CWE will introduce Invenergy, the Project, and the Article 10 review process, and CWE will solicit specific feedback on issues that stakeholders want considered in the Project design or review. This feedback will be tracked in a comment log as discussed in Section 5.5.

Depending on the number of individual stakeholders, it may not be practical to contact each individually. As discussed in Section 5, CWE will develop materials, maintain a project website, and host events designed to inform landowners and residents. These materials, events, and the website will describe the Project and ways to submit input during the Article 10 review process.

#### Distribution of PSS and Application Documents to Stakeholders

Stakeholders will be made aware of PSS and application availability at the Project website and at various document repositories. CWE does not intend to provide individual hard copies of these documents to Stakeholders except as required by 16 NYCRR §1000.5 and 16 NYCRR §1000.6.

### **4 Stakeholders**

CWE has identified several categories of “stakeholders.” Overall, CWE has relied on its experience developing other projects, review of PIPs filed for other projects, discussions with local officials, and the knowledge of its local representatives to identify potential stakeholders.

Descriptions of stakeholder categories and the methods used to identify them follow. Appendix A contains the Project stakeholder list and the currently known contact information for each stakeholder. CWE will update the stakeholder list to add or remove stakeholders it identifies new interested, or uninterested, parties during the course of PIP implementation.

Project outreach materials will contain instructions on how to be added to the stakeholder list. Individuals or organizations will be able to be added to the stakeholder list by calling a Project representative, calling a toll-free number, attending a public outreach event such as those for residents, or by sending an email to an address that will be posted on the Project website.

#### 4.1 Host Communities

Town boards and county boards representing any portion of the Project Area were identified by review of town and county boundary maps and are considered stakeholders. Points of contact will be the Town Supervisors and the County Administrator(s), and the town and county and legislative clerks. Notices will be addressed to the full board, care of the point of contact, with the expectation that the point of contact

will distribute the notices and information to the full board. CWE will meet with the points of contact prior to submittal of the PSS and will offer to meet with the full boards.

#### 4.2 County Agencies

County agencies, other than the county legislature, with areas of responsibility potentially affected by the Project were identified by review of the county website and consultation with the county planning department. Note that the County Emergency Response Coordinator and Sheriff are identified as stakeholders and are listed under the category of “Emergency Responders.”

#### 4.3 State Agencies

CWE identified New York State government stakeholders from the Article 10 regulations, from CWE’s experience in developing wind projects in New York, and by reviewing PIPs filed for other wind projects.

#### 4.4 Federal Agencies

Agencies of the U.S. government were identified using the Article 10 regulations and CWE’s experience in developing wind projects in New York.

#### 4.5 Legislative Representatives

Offices of the New York State Legislature, the U.S. Senate, and U.S. Congress representing the Study Area were identified by review of online district maps.

#### 4.6 Highway Departments

County and town departments responsible for managing roads in the Study Area were identified by review of town and county boundary maps.

#### 4.7 Schools

School districts serving parcels in the Study Area and school districts adjacent to these districts were identified by review of county tax maps.

#### 4.8 Emergency Responders

Fire departments, emergency responders and police or sheriff departments serving parcels in the Study Area were identified by review of county tax maps.

#### 4.9 Adjacent Municipalities

Towns, villages, or other municipalities, whether in New York or Pennsylvania, that are not host communities but are in the Study Area were identified by review of municipal boundary maps.

#### 4.10 Utilities

Companies that own gas, electric, or communications infrastructure in the Study Area were identified by consultation with the County Planning Department.

#### 4.11 Public Interest Groups

Organizations that serve interests of the public in the Study Area were identified from discussions with the County Planning Department and from the 2016 list of county officials that includes county and town historians. This category includes business organizations, county and town historians, conservation or environmental organizations, and organized groups focused on use of the Project Area for outdoor recreation.

#### 4.12 Airports and Heliports

Organizations operating FAA-registered airfields within 12 miles of the Project Area were identified by searching the FAA's database on licensed airports and heliports. The nearest public airport identified has a runway that is 13 miles from the nearest part of the Project Area. This airport is included as a potential stakeholder. No heliports were identified within 3 miles of the Project Area.

#### 4.13 Participating Landowners

Property owners that have entered into lease, easement, purchase option, or setback agreements with CWE that will allow construction of Project facilities on or near their property are considered "participating landowners."

Participating landowners are included in the stakeholder list as one group, but not individually. CWE's private contracts with these landowners contains provisions for CWE and landowners to work together on Project plans. These consultations are private discussions outside the scope of this PIP. In addition to private communications with CWE via mail or email, participating landowners living in the Project Area will be notified of Project milestones and events in the same manner as all residents of the Project Area.

#### 4.14 Adjacent Landowners

Owners of property that abut parcels where Project facilities are planned, or whose properties are within 2,500 feet of a wind turbine, or substation, or within 500 feet of other Project components (e.g. collection lines, met tower, O&M facility, etc.), and any additional landowners whose homes are within 5,000 feet of a turbine, but who are not participating landowners, are considered "adjacent landowners." When a Project layout is developed, CWE will identify these owners by review of tax records and will add the adjacent owners individually to the stakeholder list. These owners will receive mailings notifying them of Project milestones and events. CWE intends to develop a project layout during the fall of 2016, and will share it at outreach events with participating and adjacent landowners when it is available. CWE plans to include a layout in the preliminary scoping statement (PSS).

#### 4.15 Area Residents

Residents of the Study Area that are not participating landowners or adjacent owners are included in the stakeholder list as one group. CWE plans to notify these residents of the Project individually by widespread mailing announcing the open house to all unique addresses in the property tax rolls for the Study Area, and sharing basic outreach materials such as factsheets. This mailing will also include instructions on how to register as a stakeholder, in case the residents cannot attend the open houses but wish to remain informed. At the open house, attendees will be encouraged to join the stakeholder list if they wish to continue to

receive notice of future Project milestones (e.g., availability of the PSS, public hearing, etc.). After the open house, CWE does not plan broad mailings to area residents that do not register as stakeholders. These residents would still likely hear more of the Project through public outreach activities and notices in area newspapers.

## **5 Public Involvement Program Elements**

### **5.1 PIP Activities, Schedule, and Goals**

Appendix C lists the PIP activities CWE plans to conduct and the tentative schedule and goals for each activity. In addition to the initial meetings, PIP activities will be conducted throughout the Article 10 process, including after the PSS and Application have been submitted.

#### **5.1.1 Stakeholders Consultations**

Stakeholder consultations will be arranged as described in Section 3. CWE anticipates almost all stakeholders will be interested in a meeting or conference call. For any such stakeholder meetings or conference calls, one or more of the representatives identified in Section 5.2 will represent CWE.

Topics covered during stakeholder consultations will vary depending on the stakeholder's role and potential impact. Possible topics include payment in lieu of tax agreements, highway agreements, local laws, emergency response requirements, intervenor funds, and environmental impacts. Meetings will also specifically cover potential synergies or conflicts with stakeholder plans. Content of stakeholder consultation meetings will be documented in the PIP Tracking Report and comments received will be recorded as discussed in Section 5.5.

As appropriate, CWE will conduct subsequent meetings to answer specific questions, and to discuss studies, mitigation, or other strategies that could address stakeholder concerns.

A tentative schedule of initial consultations is provided in Appendix B.

#### **5.1.2 Town Board Meetings**

In the spring and summer of 2017, CWE will present at regularly-scheduled monthly board meetings of the local town boards in the Project Area. CWE will also request to present the project to the County Legislature at one of its regularly-scheduled meetings.

As part of the presentation given at each meeting, CWE will introduce Invenergy, the Project, and the Article 10 process, including Intervenor Funding, and will respond to questions from the board and members of the public.

CWE representatives will be available to attend future town board meetings as requested by the boards.

The above meetings and any future presentations at town board meetings will be documented in the PIP tracking report.

### 5.1.3 Open House

CWE will hold one or more open house-style public meetings with representatives of CWE’s development team participating in the meeting. The meeting will feature a brief PowerPoint presentation and poster displays on the Project, wind energy, and the Article 10 review process, including the process and availability of Intervenor Funding. A brief presentation by one of CWE representatives will start the meeting and ample time will be allowed for review of display materials and one-on-one discussions with CWE representatives. As part of the presentation, CWE will emphasize the role of stakeholders and encourage interested area residents to join the stakeholder list.

The open house will be advertised at town board meetings, by mailings to stakeholders (including to all study area residents as described in Section 4.15), on the Project website, and in the newspapers listed in Section 5.2 with at least two weeks’ notice. Based on interest at the first Open House, and number of people registering as stakeholders, CWE may host a second Open House, or a tele-town hall or other electronic meetings as indicated by stakeholder feedback, and as opportunities arise.

As part of its mailing to stakeholders on the open house, CWE will include instructions on how to contact CWE if a stakeholder is unable to attend the open house and would like to schedule a one-on-one meeting, a conference call, or attend another open house.

Contact information for local representatives are posted on the project-specific website. Additionally, this information will be made available at stakeholder consultations, town board meetings and open houses. No local project office is planned at this time.

### 5.2.2 Toll-Free Number

Invenergy also maintains a toll-free number (1-866-378-4580) connected to an automated voicemail that it will advertise on the Project website and monitor for questions on the Canisteo Project. This line is not

dedicated, so callers should identify the project they are calling about. Callers will receive responses within ten days of leaving a message.

CWE will update the website as the Project develops and more information becomes available. When available, the following items will be posted on the website:

- Links to the Article 10 siting board webpage and to case-specific documents file for the Project;

### 5.3 PIP Materials

For initial presentations given at town board meetings and at open house(s), CWE presents information on CWE, the Project, and the Article 10 process. Presentations will contain maps, timelines, and other project-specific material developed by CWE.

PIP materials will cover some wind energy basics, but most residents are generally familiar with wind turbines, as the Howard Wind Farm, located ten miles north of the Project Area was constructed five years ago, and Invenergy's Marsh Hill wind energy center was built in the middle of the Project Area in 2014. CWE materials will be focused on unique aspects of CWE and the Project, the Article 10 review process, and how the wind technology used in the Project will compare to the turbines already in the area.

At the open house, CWE presented poster board displays on topics such as:

- recent growth trends in the wind industry,
- environmental, emission offset, and fuel offset benefits of wind energy,
- expected changes in turbine dimensions and technology during the period when the Project will be in development,
- sound emission levels for a typical turbine model that might be used for the Project;
- Project schedule;
- economic benefits of the Project to the local economy;

For meetings following the open house, CWE anticipates the items of most interest will be maps showing proposed locations of project facilities. CWE generated such maps in large format for display as part of its presentations after the open house.

CWE will develop materials on the above topics using information from its wind turbine suppliers, its knowledge of the Article 10 process; and industry sources such as the American Wind Energy Association. Versions of these materials will be available on the Project website.

#### 5.4 PIP Tracking Report

CWE will maintain a log documenting PIP activities, meetings, and consultations. For each event, the log will document the event date, location, attendees, summary of topics discussed, and any follow-up steps.

Every two months, CWE will file the PIP tracking report with the Secretary to the Commission and post it on the Project website.

#### 5.5 Comment Tracking

CWE will maintain an internal log of comments or questions that are not simply answered or that may have interest to a broad audience. CWE will refer to this comment log in development of the PSS and application to ensure that comments are being adequately addressed.

### **6 Environmental Justice Areas**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) provides map files of Potential Environmental Justice Areas it identifies as census block groups from the 2000 census (not 2010 Census data) with populations that meet one or more of the following thresholds:

- 51.1% or more of the population in an urban area reported themselves to be members of minority groups; or
- 33.8% or more of the population in a rural area reported themselves to be members of minority groups; or
- 23.59% or more of the population in an urban or rural area had household incomes below the federal poverty level.

No Potential Environmental Justice Areas are within the Project or Study Areas, but the following three are in Steuben County within 10 miles of the Project Area:

- Census Block Group ID: 361019609003 is located approximately 8.5 miles north of the Project Area. This area is in the City of Hornell. It's categorized as an urban area, and 2000 census statistics show 10.76% are minorities and 30.94% are below the federal poverty level.
- Census Block Group ID: 361019608002 is located approximately 9 miles north of the Project Area. This area is in the City of Hornell. It's categorized as an urban area, and 2000 census statistics show 5.42% are minorities and 31.76% are below the federal poverty level.
- Census Block Group ID: 361019609001 is located approximately 8.5 miles north of the Project Area. This area is in Steuben County in the city of Hornell (contiguous with census block 361019609003 above). It is categorized as an urban area, where 5.3% are minorities and 27% are below the federal poverty level.

Outside Steuben County, but within 10 miles of the Project Area, is the following Potential Environmental Justice Area:

- Census Block Group ID: 360039508002 is located approximately 9 miles west of the Project Area. This area is in Allegany County in the Town of Alfred. It's categorized as a rural area, and 2000 census statistics show 9.87% are minorities and 28.76% are below the federal poverty level.

## 7 Language Access

Article 10 regulations require the PIP to identify any language other than English spoken (1) by 5,000 or more persons, according to United States Census data, residing in any 5-digit zip code postal zone in which any portion of such zone is located within the Study Area; and (2) by a significant population of persons residing in close proximity to the proposed facility, alternative locations, or interconnections.

Table 1 lists the 5-digit zip codes extending into the Study Area and the most prevalent non-English languages spoken. As shown by Table 1, there are no zip codes touched by the Study Area where 5,000 or more people do not speak English. The Spanish-speaking numbers are included in the Non-English totals, and are a sub-set thereof.
